that Mr. Jackson has seen with regret that Facts which it has his duty to state in his official correspondence, have been deemed a sufficient motive for breaking an important negotiation and for ending an end to all communication ever with the Minister charged as Sovereign with that negotiation interesting to both nations, on one point of which an answer has not even been returned to official and written overture.

The other, viz that that intimation is the only one in which conditions were prescribed to Erskine for the conclusion of an agreement on the matter to which later, is known to Mr. Jackson the instructions which he has himself received.

stating these facts and in adherence to them, as his duty imperiously demanded him to do, Mr. Jackson had not imagine that offence had been taken at it by the American government, as most certainly could be intended on his part; since he has been informed by the Secretary of State that no farther communications will be received from him, he conceives that he has no alternative that is consistent with what is due to the King's dignity but to withdraw altogether the seat of the American Government, and await the arrival of the Majesty's commands upon the subject for which has been given to his affairs in this country.

Mr. Jackson means to make New York the place of his residence.
