The two brigs, the Alceste and the Raillear, re immediately ordered to make fail to windward, to prevent the enemy's light ref-

fel from continuing her foundings.

The fignals for itowing the hammocks, and making ready for fight; for announcing the refolution of engaging at anchor; and for recalling the men on board their respective thips, were all made at three.

The long boats employed in waiting were also recalled; a boat was hakily dispatched from the Attemile to the thouls of Roletta, to ac-

quaint the transports there with the appearance of the enemy; and finally the frigates and curvettes were ordered, to feed as many of their men as possible on board the ships of the line.

The enemy's squadron continued to advance with a prefs of fail; after flanding of a considerable distance, to avoid the breakers of the illand," it hauled its wind, thorrened fail, and clearly manifefted a defign to arrack us.

At three quarters after ave, the battery on the illand threw fomelbombs, which fell into the van of the enemy'l list. At fix the admiral threw out the fignal for commencing the engagment, and fhortly alter, the two head

most, thips began kring, Several of the enemy's veilels having feddeniy thorrened fail, had turned the head of our line, and letting go their anchon, with a cable aftern, had ranged along side, between es and the land; while others had, moored themselves within piffol shot of as, on the other fule ; by this manceuvre, all our veffete, as far down as the Tonnant, found themfelves completely envelloped, and placed between two fires. It appeared to us that in executing this manogure, two of their vessels had run aground; one of them however, was immedistely got off.

The attack and the defence were extremely brife. The whole of our van was attacked one both fides, and fometimes raked. In this disorder, and involved as we were in continual clouds of fmoke, it was extremely difficult to distinguish the different move-

ments of the line.

At the beginning of the action, the admiral, all the superior officers, first commissary and about twenty pilots, and mafters of transports, were on the poop of the thip, f employed in ferring the mulquetry. All the foldiers and failors, were ordered to the guns on the main and lower decks; the twelve poundes were not haif manned.

After the action had lasted about an hoer the admiral was wounded in the body- and is the hand; he then came down from the poop and a short time after, was killed on the

quarter deck.

Obliged to defend outfelves on both fides, we gave up the twelve pounden; but the twenty-fours, and thirty fix's kept up their fire with all possible ardour. The Franklin and the Tonnant appeared to be in as criti-cal a fituation as ourfelves.

The English having otterly destroyed our

van, foffered their fires to drift reward, Rill ranging along our line and taking their different dations around us; while we [M. S. illegible) van cut off, were frequently oblig-ed to veer away our cabie, or our hawfer, to enable on to prefent our broadlide to the
