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Extra 2 of a fetter from a gentleman now reliding at Quebec, to his correlpendent in New York; dated Janu-

ary 9, 1792. " Our humanity was deeply affected by the dreadful carnage made by the Indians. You may be affured that the number of Indians did not exceed 1000, and that nothing faved Oen! St. Clair, and the remainder of his army but the great quantity of plunder he left to the Indians; they were compoled of various tribes, and three fourths of them remained in the camp to plunder it and to take scalps, the trophies of their victory; and he that got most when he returned to his nation, acquired the great-eft share of glory; hence only about 200 purfued. The loss of the Indiana is under 20 killed and 30 wounded. The victory they have obtained at fo ealy a purchale, and the riches they obtained by the plunder, and the provisions they found, will make them a more terrible foe than they have ever been; they boalt of taking an amazing quantity of powder and arms, which they wanted; many of them were only armed with spears and hatchets, and I have no doubt but if another expedition should be set on soot, that they will be met by three times the number of Indians. The Indian tribes of nations who live many hundred miles back have all entered into an affociation, and made the prefent war a common concern, they have made peace among themselves to enable them to oppose what they call the common enemy. The warriors of the different tribes to united, are not less than 15 or 20,000; numbers of the chiefs of ten or twelve numerous nations were here last summer. Lord Dorchester advised them to make peace, and offered his mediation: He told them that he was at peace, with the: United States, and could give them no affiltance. Their answer was, that the enemy was in their country, and would not make peace with them, but on terms dishonourable, and at the expence of their country, and that they were determined to die before they would accept of such terms. They left us much diffatisfied with the anfwer they received, and with a full determination to defend their country

with the last drop of their blood.

"You may depend on it, that many years will elpse, and many thousand men be expended before the United States will, by the present measures, he able to posses the country in contest, and I may also add, that I have great apprehensions; that great descriptions.
